ALLOTMENT NOTES

Allotment Angels have been very active on our site lately. They have helped a number of our gardeners who haven't been able to do the usual work on their plots for a variety of reasons. The Angels have planted, watered, weeded and cleared badly overgrown ground, motivated by a genuine desire to help others. They have transformed a place to simply grow vegetables and flowers into a community.

We have a supply of wood chippings which are in a designated area near the top of the allotment site. Several of our gardeners who are new to the site and have been transforming overgrown plots and uneven ground have been using the chippings to make pathways within their allotments. UPDATE ON THE SPRINGFIELDS PAVILION DEVELOPMENT

After being awarded a grant from the National Lottery Community Fund, GRB Building Services has installed a brand new kitchen in the pavilion. The kitchen has new cabinets and appliances. This is the first stage in updating the existing building.

Following the consideration of several tender documents, the Parish Council has now chosen a contractor to undertake the redevelopment and extension of the pavilion at Springfields. We expect this work to commence later this year, but will confirm details in the next issue of The Pump.

ANGLIAN WATER UNFLUSHABLES AND FOG - DEFINITIONS

Unflushables – this is a catch-all term for anything that is flushed down the toilet that shouldn't be. It is most love every dro commonly used to describe wet wipes and sanitary products, but could also refer to any other litter which is anglianwai washed down drains and ends up in the sewers.



FOG – this stands for fats, oils and grease. These are a particular problem because they solidify in the sewers and congeal with unflushables to cause blockages, often known as "fatbergs".

The facts:

If we put FOG down our sinks, and unflushables down the loo, it can block sewer pipes and pumps, flooding homes and gardens and spilling into local rivers and waterways.

Blocked pipes are one of the most common causes of river pollution and flooding.

Over half of the 40,000 sewer blockages in our region are caused by FOG and unflushables.

Our sewers and drains are only designed to carry the three Ps – Pee, Poo and Paper (toilet).

Our Keep it Clear Campaign

Our Keep It Clear programme helps reduce the misery, cost, bad smells and potential flooding and pollution caused by avoidable blockages.

We're acting now to detect and remove blockages in the network, using the latest technology cameras and high-powered jets. Last year, Anglian Water removed over 3,000 tonnes of wipes, sanitary products and cooking oils from sewers. That's like 30 blue whales blocking our pipes!

Our recent project in Southend-on-Sea helped us to understand the items flushed down the toilet which cause repeated blockages in the area. Our specialist team used CCTV cameras to assess the sewer pipes, and then removed 460 tonnes (the same weight as 4.5 blue whales) of unflushables and other waste from an area serving just 180,000 people. We sent samples of what we removed to be analysed, and it was no surprise to find that the main culprit was wet wipes containing plastic fibres, accounting for 85% of the material by weight together with sanitary products and other singleuse items.

The Keep it Clear campaign aims to educate the public on the following three things:

1. Only flush the three Ps – Pee, Poo and Paper down the toilet

2. Put wet wipes and sanitary items in the bin

3. Once cooled, put oil into the bin

Our policy work on wet wipes

We have been campaigning for some time for better education and labelling around wet wipes, so that the public know to always "BIN THE WIPE!". Around 90% of wet wipes contain some sort of plastic which means that unlike toilet paper, they don't break down in our sewers. We support mandatory labelling on packaging about disposal and impact of wet wipes on the environment. Giving consumers more information (for example, telling them NOT to flush wet wipes down the toilet) to drive behaviour change would be a huge benefit to the health of our sewerage systems in the UK. Labelling should also be clear, identifiable, and easily visible (this means not hidden in the small print on the back of a product).

We also support the government's recent announcement to ban plastic in wet wipes. However, the single most important message still needs to be not to put wet wipes of any kind down the toilet. Even without plastic, they will still bock the sewage pipes as they wont disintegrate like toilet paper

Our June meeting was a very enjoyable visit to the Milton Keynes Museum on a lovely day. After looking around the Victorian garden, it was good to be indoors for a time, touring the museum and enjoying the scones in the tea room! Our garden party in July was again moved to the hall, this time because of the rain. However, despite the decision being very last-minute, all was well! Thanks to those who helped and brought cakes.

There is no meeting in August, so the next one will be a bingo session on **September 13th**, doors open 2pm. It will be a little different, but still just as much fun!

Advance notice of our meeting on **11th October**: our popular quiz master, Roger Young will come to talk about pearls. For some years, Roger worked in The Philippines. Whilst there he began to get involved in the fascinating world of pearls. This promises to be very interesting.



'Plastic flowers and plastic wreaths are not permitted; except that wreaths and other arrangements of artificial poppies may be introduced to commemorate those who have died in the service of their country in time of war or other conflict.' Plastic flowers get caught in the mower or strimmer, which spreads particles of plastic far and wide. To prevent this and conform with the regulations, plastic flowers in the churchyard will be removed.

It would be lovely to have more members on the PCC. There are only 5 or 6 meetings a year and membership does NOT mean that you are expected to be at church every Sunday, but the more people there are of different ages and from all parts of Padbury and by knowing what is wanted, the better the church can serve the village. If you are unsure, get in touch. Talking about it commits you to nothing but will give you a better idea of what is involved.

Would you like to put flowers in the church, perhaps to celebrate a special occasion or just because you love fresh flowers? In order to be more environmentally friendly, no oasis is used and to lower the carbon footprint flowers grown in the UK, preferably locally, are used What's wrong with wild flowers in jam jars, simplicity is beautiful? 'Church flowers can look good without filling the sea with microplastic'. Again, get in touch if you think it is something that you would like to do.

Finally, what a lovely wedding St Mary's hosted - even the weather almost behaved itself. Everything about it was exactly as a country church, village family wedding should be.
